A ranking of values directly, though often subconsciously, determines decision making. The things that are important and seen as most valuable will be the things that one works hardest to achieve as well as protect.

Dilemmas occur when a conflict arises between two or more of these values. Dilemmas may not always be a choice between two opposite values but often between two equal seeming outcomes. The dilemma results because of the difficulty in choosing one course and its likely outcome over another course and its likely outcome.
